Survey, wildfire, awards

Parish Preparedness Survey

246 of 328

City, town and parish councils have not yet returned the survey. All 246 are listed in Appendix A.
82 returned. 25 per cent. As at 25 August 2026.

This is a paper survey, so it needs emailing out. It asks each council to score thirteen hazards, then covers people, plans, equipment and communications. Where a council has not responded, we plan around it without knowing whether it has a plan, a co-ordinator, a Place of Safety or a phone signal. Non-response is not the same as no risk.

YOUR ACTION

Find your parishes in Appendix A and email the survey to their clerk. Then put it on the agenda of their next meeting.

Drought and wildfire risk

Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service declared drought on 29 July and asked the public to protect water supplies and prevent fires. Vegetation is tinder-dry, and disposable barbecues easily ignite moorland, heathland and woodland.

Their campaign asks people to pack a picnic instead of lighting a barbecue. It asks for a swap rather than a sacrifice, which is why it works.

Four things to share:

- Never light a fire in the open.
- Take all litter home, especially reflective items.
- Never throw lit cigarettes onto dry ground.
- Call 999 immediately if you see a fire.

Statutory guidelines on disposable barbecues, 14 August. In response to the drought and heatwave, the Government has issued statutory guidelines under the General Product Safety Regulations 2005. Its position is that disposable barbecues cannot be considered a safe product in current conditions, and that they should not be made available for sale, in store or online, at the present time. The guidelines are made by the Department for Business, Innovation, Science and Trade, and are enforced by the Office for Product Safety and Standards together with local authority Trading Standards. They will be withdrawn once weather conditions change enough to reduce the risk.

This changes the ask. Until now the retail message was voluntary. It is now a legal expectation, so a shop, garage or campsite in your division still selling disposable barbecues is a conversation worth having, politely and early.

YOUR ACTION

Ask any shop, garage or campsite in your division that still sells disposable barbecues to take them off the shelf, and send them the GOV.UK guidelines.

Community Risk Register 2026

Reissued in July by the Avon and Somerset Local Resilience Forum. It covers eight risks: flooding, extreme weather, animal disease, infectious disease, transport incidents, industrial accidents, utility failure, and malicious threats including cyber crime. Short, plain and readable.

YOUR ACTION

Share the link. Ask parishes to spend ten minutes on it at a meeting and answer one question: which two of these eight apply most to us?

Community Resilience Awards

Running since 2022, the awards recognise people and groups who have gone above and beyond to help their community deal with emergencies. They are presented at the Community Resilience Day in October. Nominations for 2026 are open now and close on Tuesday 22 September. The form is short and online.

The examples are usefully ordinary: a flood group that keeps the plan up to date, a councillor who thinks ahead, someone who set up a list of who is vulnerable. Most divisions have one of these people, and they rarely put themselves forward.

YOUR ACTION

Nominate one group and one person from your division. Both categories run, so you can do both. Nominations close on Tuesday 22 September 2026.

Community Flood Action Fund

The Somerset Rivers Authority runs a small grants fund for works that reduce flooding in Somerset. Grants of between £3,000 and £20,000 may be awarded, and a total of £520,000 has been approved by the SRA Board since its launch in November 2024.

The August deadline has now passed. Deadlines run on a rolling three-monthly basis, four times a year, so the next one is Tuesday 24 November 2026, followed by Tuesday 23 February 2027. The Somerset Prepared small grant scheme is a separate fund on separate quarterly dates, set out below.

This is the one item in the calendar that puts money into a parish rather than asking for its time. Most parishes with a recurring flooding problem already know what the fix is. What they usually lack is someone telling them the fund exists and the date it closes.

Appendix B lists the schemes approved by the fund so far, so members can check which projects have been successful and show a parish what a fundable scheme looks like.

YOUR ACTION

Tell any parish with a known flooding problem about the fund this week. The next deadline is Tuesday 24 November, which means getting it onto a September or October agenda rather than a November one.

Appendix B lists the schemes already approved, which is the quickest way to show a parish the sort of work that gets funded.

Somerset Prepared small grant scheme

A separate fund from the Community Flood Action Fund, and a different set of dates. Grants of up to £5,000 are available to town and parish councils and to flood groups, for equipment and training that improves resilience to emergencies. Applications are considered quarterly.

The next quarterly deadline is Wednesday 30 September 2026.

This is the fund for the things a flood scheme grant will not cover: signage, sandbag stores, radios, generators, defibrillator cabinets, first aid or flood warden training. A parish that has been told its problem is too small for the Community Flood Action Fund should usually be pointed here instead.

YOUR ACTION

Tell your parishes and any flood group in your division before the end of September. Equipment and training bids need a decision at a meeting, so a parish meeting in early September is the realistic last chance to get one in.

September

30 Days 30 Ways UK: preparedness month

A daily preparedness campaign across social media through September, run by the Emergency Planning Society and co-ordinated at Local Resilience Forum level. Topics come from the national and local risk registers, so it maps onto the register above.

Typical prompts: have you got a grab bag? What would you do about your pets if you had to leave in a hurry? Do you know how to turn off your water, gas and electricity?

All materials are Creative Commons licensed, so parish newsletters can lift them directly without asking permission.

YOUR ACTION

Follow #30days30waysUK and re-share through September. Ask parish clerks to put the bingo card in newsletters and on noticeboards. Prepare this in August so something goes out on 1 September.

A Walk for a Life, Saturday 5 September

A walk in Taunton to remember those lost to suicide, raise awareness, and encourage people in Somerset to take action to prevent it. A second evening event follows on Thursday 17 September, 5.30pm to 8.30pm, meet at Shepton Library, 2 Market Place, Shepton Mallet, BA4 5AZ, following a wheelchair/pushchair friendly loop around Collett Park.

An exhibition at Ilminster Arts Centre of young people's visions of Ilminster's life and future. It runs from 1 to 17 September.

Worth flagging beyond Ilminster. Young people describing what they want their town to be is a resilience conversation in its own right, and it is a model other towns could copy.

YOUR ACTION

Share it with schools, youth groups and families in your division, and go and see it if you are nearby.

Somerset Rivers Authority Board, Friday 11 September

The SRA Board usually meets four times a year to make decisions and review progress. Meetings are normally scheduled for three and a quarter hours, though actual durations vary. Members of the public and press are welcome to attend.

The next meeting is on Friday 11 September 2026 at 9.45am, in the Committee Room at Taunton Town Council Offices, Dean House, Belvedere Road, Taunton TA1 1HE.

Public questions are the part most people do not know about. A parish with a drainage or river maintenance issue can put it directly to the Board, on the record, rather than through a chain of officers.

To speak, a question or statement must be submitted in writing at least three clear working days before the meeting. The Board meets on a Friday morning, so the deadline is noon on the Monday before: **noon on Monday 7 September** for the 11 September meeting. Email it to sra@somerset.gov.uk and mark it clearly "Public Question for the SRA Board". Speaking time is normally three minutes, with up to 30 minutes for public questions overall. Agendas are published about 11 calendar days ahead.

YOUR ACTION

Tell parishes with a flooding or watercourse issue that they can submit a public question. For the 11 September meeting the deadline is noon on Monday 7 September. Board papers are published on the meetings page.

Health Information Morning, Pilton, Saturday 12 September

Pilton Parish Council is running a Health Information Morning at Pilton Village Hall, 9am to 1pm. It is for Pilton parishioners, so it is not an event to circulate more widely.

Somerset Council will offer free NHS Health Checks on the day to those who meet the eligibility criteria. Checks are carried out by a qualified clinician in a private room and are confidential. Nothing from a health check is shared with the parish council. Appointments are booked in advance through the parish.

Also attending: Somerset Sight, MIND, Health Connectors, Dementia Specialist Nurses, and the Acute Community Eye Service. Everyone is welcome to drop in.

The format is easy to copy: a hall, a Saturday morning, and the services that are already funded to be there.

YOUR ACTION

This one is included as a model rather than a date to share. If a parish in your division would like to run something similar, the format is simple enough to lift, and the NHS Health Checks are already a Somerset Council offer.

Act to Adapt, Saturday 5, Tuesday 15 and Sunday 27 September

Somerset Wildlife Trust's Act to Adapt process helps communities write their own climate adaptation plans. Three dates in September:

Pilton Show, Saturday 5 September, 2pm to 5pm. The Act to Adapt team will have a consultation stand at the Pilton Show. Drop in to give your thoughts, experiences and ideas on how climate change is affecting the area, and what a community-led adaptation plan should cover. No booking needed.

Porlock, Tuesday 15 September, 7pm to 9.30pm, Porlock Village Hall. A free two-hour workshop to start Porlock's adaptation plan, working in groups on how climate change is affecting the village and what can be done locally. Wheelchair accessible, hearing loop, parking for around 30 cars, free drinks and snacks. Free to attend, but please register so numbers can be planned.

Shepton Mallet, Sunday 27 September, 10am to 3pm, Sunday Market. Act to Adapt is working with Shepton Mallet on a plan for the local area. Find the team at the market to hear the ideas that came out of the summer workshop and add your own. No booking needed.

YOUR ACTION

Share all three dates. Porlock is one for Exmoor and coastal parishes. The Pilton Show and the Shepton Mallet market are both drop-in, so they suit a newsletter or a Facebook group. If a community in your division would like to run its own process, point them at Act to Adapt.

Community Resilience Day, Wednesday 21 October

Free, for parish, town and city council and community group representatives. Workshops, networking and equipment demonstrations. Organised by the Somerset Prepared Partnership and funded by Somerset Rivers Authority. The Resilience Awards are presented here.

This is the best date in the calendar for a parish starting from scratch. Free, on a weekday so clerks can arrange cover, and Street is reachable from most of the county.

YOUR ACTION

Book your own place, then ask one representative from each of your parishes to book. Pair this with the survey chase: the councils in Appendix A are the ones who should be in that room.

All month in libraries

Children's flood awareness treasure hunts, flood-themed book collections to borrow, story time sessions, and displays in 10 to 12 libraries. Extra activity at: Chard, Crewkerne and Ilminster (displays and drop-ins); Burnham and Bridgwater (displays, rhyme times, Lego club); North Petherton and Nether Stowey (displays); Minehead and Williton (displays).

The three sessions on 26, 28 and 30 October are family workshops, and they fall in half term.

YOUR ACTION:

Promote your nearest library, framed at families for the half-term dates. If a library in your division is not listed and wants to join in, say so. There is still scope to add.

People's Emergency Briefing Film, Langport, Thursday 15 October

Transition Film Langport are screening the People's Emergency Briefing Film at 7pm at The Angel, Bow Street, Langport. Publicity for the screening is due out before the end of August.

It falls the week before the Act to Adapt session in Langport, which is deliberate. The film gives people the context; the workshop turns it into a plan.

YOUR ACTION

Share the date with Langport and the surrounding parishes once the publicity is out. Pair it with the Act to Adapt session on 21 October in anything you send, so people see the two as one offer rather than two evenings out.

Act to Adapt Langport, Wednesday 21 October

A free evening event run by Somerset Wildlife Trust in the Parrett Room, Langport Town Hall, 7pm to 9.30pm. Teas, coffees and refreshments provided. Funded by Somerset Rivers Authority.

The session sets out Somerset's climate projections, discusses how Langport is affected, and starts work on a Climate Adaptation Plan for the town. Attendance is free, but registering in advance helps the organisers plan numbers.

YOUR ACTION

Share with Langport and the surrounding parishes, alongside the film on 15 October. Registration is through the Somerset Wildlife Trust events page.

November

Winter readiness

Getting households ready before the weather arrives, not during it. Tinned food and bottled water, a working torch, a wind-up or battery radio, blankets, an alternative means of heating, and a plan for pets.

Priority Services Register. Utility companies must offer priority support to people of pensionable age, with a disability, or in long-term ill health. You have to opt in personally. It is not automatic, and most eligible people are not on it.

Questions to put to a parish directly:

- Where is your place of safety in a power cut? Has the village hall got a generator?

- Who is vulnerable, and who would check on them?
- Where would the council meet, and what are your first three actions?

YOUR ACTION

Put winter readiness on parish agendas in November, not December. Ask in October: most clerks need agenda items a week or more ahead, so a November request usually lands in December. Push the Priority Services Register: it is the highest-value thing a resident can do, and almost nobody knows it exists.

Spring 2027

Forward look

Not yet live. Please do not circulate as a confirmed programme.

Cool spaces and heatwave planning. The June 2026 heatwave prompted real interest from communities offering buildings as cool spaces, mirroring the warm spaces model.

“Love Your River” month, July 2027.

This revives something DEFRA ran some years ago. The idea is simply to improve people’s awareness, appreciation and care of their local watercourses, which will help with flooding and resilience conversations further down the line.

In development at the moment: family-friendly resources for being by the river, a poetry, prose and art competition, and activities aimed particularly at Year 6 students, who always need their time filled once SATs have finished.

Appendix B
